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Early Years have enjoyed their artistic week, following our whole school Take One Picture theme. The children enjoyed listening to the story that was linked to the picture of The Courtyard of a House in Delft by Pieter de Hooch. The story was about people helping each other and the children were able to share stories about how they help each other in class and will continue to do so in their new classrooms when they come back in September.

The children looked carefully at the painting, sharing what they could see. They then imagined what they would see through the arch if they walked through. We had lots of very creative suggestions, such as a storm, beautiful flowers and castles with knights standing guard. All the children painted pictures of what they thought they would see. Ash class wrote sentences to match their pictures as well as Saplings, with some help from their teachers.

We also collected sticks and twigs during a Forest session and used them to create broomsticks, just like the one we could see in the painting.

On Thursday, Ash and Saplings transformed into Beech and Ash children as they spent the morning in their new classes. All the children really enjoyed being in their new class. Ash children came back excitedly from Beech class, sharing all the fun activities they had been doing. Saplings children were so kind to the new children who will be joining us in September, showing them the toys they can play with and working with them.







Beech class had a fantastic time during our art week. The children completed their bridges made from recycled materials and also sketched and watercolour the courtyard at the House of Delft. In English, we listened to a soundscape related to this painting. The children collected sounds they could hear and chose rhyming words to represent them. They then used their imagination to envision passing



through an archway or door. To stimulate their creativity, we discussed different


scenarios and settings they might encounter, such as enchanted forests, bustling cities, or serene beaches. The children were encouraged to think about the sights, sounds, smells, and feelings they would experience in these imagined places. They then wrote down vivid descriptions of what they saw,







heard, and felt. With these detailed notes, they crafted their rhyming poems, ensuring that their words painted a clear picture of their imagined journey. They focused on rhythm and rhyme, working to make their poems both expressive and engaging. Peer review sessions helped them refine their work, providing feedback on rhyme schemes and descriptive language. Following this, we returned to our artwork. The children created archways and then placed silhouette photos onto their watercolour paintings, representing the places they had imagined visiting.

This week has been incredibly productive and creative for our students as we embarked on our "Take One Picture" project. Here's a peek into our

exciting activities: The children crafted intricate clay figures, bringing our chosen picture to life in three dimensions. Their attention to detail and creativity were truly impressive.

Our creativity then extended to writing inspired by various soundscapes. Lime had fun exploring how different sounds can add a unique auditory dimension to their visual artwork, creating a multi-sensory experience.

Using shoeboxes, we created innovative 3D sculptures that transition from the inside to the outside, allowing the children to explore depth and perspective in their art.

Our budding artists worked with a variety of materials, including oil pastels, watercolours, poster paint, pencil, and clay. Each medium allowed them to capture different textures and effects, resulting in a diverse collection of artwork. We're incredibly proud of the creativity and hard work our students have shown this week.















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Our Art and DT week was full of fun and educational activities in Maple Class, which children used their creativity, imagination and perseverance as well as their teamwork skills. To begin with, we looked at the painting of Pieter de Hooch, 'The Courtyard of a House in Delft' and used our observational skills to create different pieces of this picture. Children made colourful, observational sketches with accuracy and there were amazed when their pieces created impressive puzzles of the original picture!





In DT, the children designed and made their own bread. In groups, they worked on many skills such as: following and adapting a basic recipe, kneading and shaping the dough, measuring and mixing the ingredients. Children listened to guidance, worked safely and with care. Needless to say that the outcome was delicious!









In PSHE, the children had their last lesson with the Saracens foundation team. In this lesson, the children shared proudly some sandwiches they made at home and discussed whether these were healthy, what ingredients they had used and from which

food groups. They then worked in groups and completed an end of unit quiz, to test the knowledge they acquired during the 'Tackling Health' course.

This week, our moneysense lesson focussed on what affects our choices about money. Children learnt that the choices they make about spending and saving their money can be influenced by, and have an impact on, other people. A game of role play enabled them to understand why they should all be critical consumers and that the choices they make about money will be affected by family and friends, the promotions, their income, their commitments, values, and culture.

We were delighted to be part of 'Take One Picture' with The National Gallery this year.

This year the focal painting is 'The Courtyard of a House in Delft 1658' by Pieter de Hooch. This masterpiece captivates with its portrayal of identities, relationships, and architectural intricacies. The 'Take One Picture' project aims to promote a lifelong passion for both art and learning serving as a catalyst for a myriad of subjects and nurturing a deeper appreciation for the chosen artwork.



In Willow Class, we focused on the relationship between the two women in the painting, asking questions such *as* 'Who are they?' 'Are they related in any way?' We imagined one of the women to be the mistress of the house (pictured standing in the archway) and the other the servant (pictured holding the young girl's hand).



We learnt that the year 1658, the date of the painting, was the height of witchcraft and witch trials across Europe.

We used this theme and the painting as a stimulus for our writing. After researching witchcraft from the 17<sup>th</sup> century, we created a scenario in which the mistress of the house, Lady Anna Peeters, has accused her servant of witchcraft and whispering incantations in her daughter's ears! We thought it would be fun to write an extract from her diary, about her feelings of betrayal, shock and town gossip. Meanwhile, servant Liselot Schaft, languishes in a cell awaiting her trial for witchcraft of which she will most certainly be found guilty. We then wrote an extract from Liselot's diary contemplating her fate.



We made our own delightful 3D interpretations of the painting 'A Courtyard of a House in Delft'. We used the archway as the basis of our designs and had such fun creating our courtyard scenes using different techniques including as sponging paint.





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We do hope you enjoyed seeing our artwork at today's Art Exhibition. From the 'Take One Picture' work to our Punch and Judy inspired puppets to our Victorian invention projects, it is clear to see we love being creative and sharing our work with you.
