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News from the classes...



In Early Years, we have been exploring using our senses. We creating listening nests in the forests to listen out for the different signs of spring, hearing lots of different bird songs form up above. We also explored different textures using our sense of touch. We decided that our feet would be able to feel most effectively without our shoes and socks on, so we got exploring, discovering different textures and building our descriptive vocabulary together. We found soft, fluffy and 'cushion-y' textures, as well as rough, spiky and hard textures. The children did a great job using their words to describe what they could feel.



The children enjoyed having their grown-ups in for Learning Together Morning this week. Thank you to all of those who were able to make it! It was a joy to see the children proudly demonstrate their learning for you all.

The children were also incredibly brave and performed their poem for the Poetry by Heart celebration assembly. They did so well and so many teachers commented on how well they spoke and performed. Well done Early Years!








Beech Class have enjoyed finishing their D&T unit on food preparation this week! They tasted different fruits and decided which they would like best in their own fruit salads. They looked at different fruit salad recipes and watched a video on how to prepare fruit. Before they had a go at cutting their own fruit for their salads, they learnt about cutting safety and watched Mrs Samuels demonstrate 'the claw' and 'the bridge' cutting method. The children did a fantastic job applying these techniques when they prepared their own fruit and were very excited to take these new skills home to help with

more food prep. The salads looked delicious and every single child had second helpings because they enjoyed them so much!

We also finished our unit in RE in which the children learnt the Christian Easter story. The children were able to confidently explain at least two different ways Christians may celebrate Easter and then compare this to what their own families do over the Easter period. We talked about how everyone has different celebrations and beliefs and therefore Easter may not be a holiday that is particularly significant for their families. After learning about the symbolism for eggs and Easter, the children used wax crayons to create patterns on egg shapes before painting them with water colours. The patterns shone through the paint and were extremely eye catching! This is a lovely craft to do at home as well if you are looking for something fun to do over the break.



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In English, we have been writing about non-chronological reports. We read lots of facts about guinea and sorted the information into sections. We then did our own research on Ipads and organised our new information. We then wrote amazing non-chronological reports.



In Maths, we have been learning about how to weigh the mass of objects and measuring capacity. We have been doing lots of estimating, weighing, comparing aand ordering of objects and liquids. We even weighed our guinea pigs- what a giggle that was... and we now know which one eats more!



Wow! What a week and what a term! Despite battling illnesses Lime Class still come out smiling as they smashed their poetry performance (check out seesaw) with great style.

This week has seen us focussing on our DT as we put together our design ideas and our skills practises to produce books with moving parts. With the making stage mostly complete – the

next thing for us to do is to see how the younger children in our school react to our books. Once we have shared the books we will need to evaluate the whole process, thinking about how our products fitted their purpose, what we did well and what we would change.

In Geography we have been concluding our topic about where water comes from by researching the River Nile – Is it really the longest river in the world? The jury is out......

Anyway, where does water come from? You'll have to ask us!

We have tested our parents and carers on what they know about equivalent fractions in our learning together morning – the tarsia puzzles were a big hit.



This week, Maple class have been learning about angles in maths. We began by measuring acute, obtuse and reflex angles before having a go at using protractors to draw angles. This proved tricky at first but we soon got the hang of it! We then moved onto calculating missing angles on a straight line, using our knowledge that a straight line is 180 degrees. We were rightly proud of our new achievements!



In English, we enjoyed spending time composing our own mystery stories. We took a section of the story each day and explored the different features needed to make our stories come alive. Our stories began with lively dialogue, included suspense

through drama and action and were resolved in unusual ways. The children enjoyed sharing their creative writing with each other and they didn't want to stop writing, even when their hands were sore!

In Re, Maple class have been learning about the events in Holy week. We acted out each of the significant days which helped us to remember Jesus' final days on earth. We then explored the Easter symbols and learnt about Easter traditions around the world. Hopefully the children will remember the events as they enjoy Easter eggs and hot cross buns this holiday.



In PE, we finished the term with a volleyball competition. There were some great rallies and positive sportsmanship in the hall.



It has been such a wonderful term, full of new learning, fundraising, and many new experiences.





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In History, we asked the question, 'Who was to blame for the sinking of the Titanic?' It was a great opportunity for us to use our awesome oracy skills and to interrogate pieces of evidence. After playing a game of 'Diamond 9' to help us organise our arguments, we presented our thoughts to the class.

Our Golden Morning on Thursday gave us the opportunity to experience new skills and activities including examining owl pellets, Computer Science and cooking (not forgetting a few fluffy chicks as well!). Thursday afternoon saw us

competing in this term's Key Stage 2 Humanities Quiz. This was a great way to check how 'sticky' our learning has been this term whilst working in mixed age teams. What a great way to bring the spring term to a close!

Maths Challenge- here we come!

Eight of our Year 5 mathematicians entered the HFL Education annual Year 5 Mathematics Challenge Competition and qualified for the final. This is a national competition for Year 5s across the country and is organised by the Herts for Learning. There were 260 teams, from Herts and all over England, both State and Independent Schools. Both teams entered the final stage and they got the 3rd and 4th places- wooohooo! Thank you to Mrs Sassis, our Maths Coordinator here at Little Hadham Primary for organising and

supporting the children and to Mrs Campbell for your support.

Junior Dragons do it again...!

Last week our Junior Dragons from Willow Class, had more fun raising money for the charity called Space. This charity supports families of children and young people who are neurodivergent. They have now raised just over
