The visit also highlighted the strength of our school team and the effective, consistent strategies that support our pupils' success. The key message from the visit was clear: Keep doing what you are doing! This is a fantastic target for us as we head into the Summer Term.

A special thank you to all those who attended Parents' Evening. It was wonderful to see such a strong turnout, and we hope you found the opportunity to engage with your child's learning both enlightening and enjoyable. The conversations held with teachers were full of positivity, highlighting the hard work and progress being made by our pupils across all areas.

This week in Beech Class, the children have been embracing the joy of Easter with a variety of creative and exciting activities. From arts and crafts to poetry and sports, it has been a fun-filled time of learning and expression!

The children have been busy making a variety of different Easter eggs, each one unique and beautifully decorated. Using watercolours, they created stunning Easter egg

designs to form a vibrant spring garden display. Their creativity and attention to detail have truly brought the season to life in our classroom!



In English, the children explored acrostic poetry, using the letters of 'EASTER' to inspire their writing. They worked hard to craft thoughtful and imaginative poems that reflected the joy and meaning of the season. It was wonderful to see their enthusiasm for poetry and their growing confidence in writing.

In Maths, both Year 1 and Year 2 have been exploring 2D and 3D shapes. The children have been identifying and naming different shapes, discussing their properties, and sorting them based on characteristics such as sides, edges, and vertices. They have also been investigating how 2D shapes can be combined to create 3D structures, deepening their understanding through hands-on activities.

As part of their creative journey, the children took time to evaluate their final pieces in art. They reflected on their work, discussing what they liked best about their designs and what they might change or improve next time. It was wonderful to see them thinking critically and appreciating their artistic progress.

In Science, we took our learning outside into the forest and onto the field, where Year 3 children collected soil samples. We were amazed at the variety of soils found in different areas of the school grounds, sparking lots of discussion about how soil forms and why it varies. Exploring nature up close has been a fantastic way to bring our learning to life.

In English, we have been busy writing and editing our historical stories about a silver coin, sharpening our storytelling skills along the way. Alongside this, we have

been learning a Robert Louis Stevenson poem by heart and beginning to memorize lines for our exciting spring performance about the Romans. With so many words in our heads, it has been a challenge, but the children have embraced it with enthusiasm!

Our Design and Technology lessons have been filled with creativity as we put the finishing touches on our books with moving parts. Soon, we will share them with each other and evaluate our work, reflecting on what went well and what we could improve. In PSHE, we tackled a big topic—taxes! We explored what they are,

why they exist, and what they pay for, creating a Diamond 9 to decide which services we think are most important. It led to some fantastic conversations about the world around us.

It was wonderful to welcome so many parents for consultations and to hear how much the children are enjoying their learning. Golden Morning was a great success, with members of Lime Class getting involved in a wide range of activities, from planting seeds to taking apart a computer! A huge well done to all the children for their hard work this term. Wishing everyone a joyful and restful Easter!





This week in Maple class, the children practiced performing poetry with expression and clarity. They proudly and confidently performed *The Night Mail* (abridged) as part of *Poetry by Heart*, focusing on articulation, rhythm and intonation and adding their own synchronised actions to bring the poem to life.

In English, the children wrote letters to the author of Cosmic, expressing how much they enjoyed the class book. They

reflected on their favourite moments, discussing the humorous and exciting parts of the story that captured their imagination. They shared their thoughts on the main characters and asked thoughtful questions about the inspiration behind the book and the writing process.

In PSHE, Maple class explored ways to stay mentally and physically healthy and safe. They discussed the importance of eating a balanced diet, staying hydrated, exercising regularly and getting enough sleep to support their physical well-being. They also highlighted the value of good hygiene, managing stress and avoiding harmful substances like smoking and alcohol. Additionally, the children discussed about staying safe online, following safety rules and surrounding themselves with positive people.



In DT, the children explored how to design a torch for a specific purpose, ensuring it met key design criteria. They learned about electrical systems and applied their knowledge by constructing a simple series circuit, identifying and naming its key components. The hands-on experience of building their torches was challenging, engaging and educational, reinforcing their understanding of how circuits function in real-world applications.

Additionally, they made delicious Chocolate Rocky Roads to take home, linking their work to the KS2 Design and Technology food objectives. They learned about food preparation, combining ingredients and considering taste, texture and presentation. The children also explored the importance of hygiene and safety when handling food, developing key practical skills while creating their delicious treats.


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In Willow Class, we began our week by diving into the vibrant world of Inuit art, focusing on the remarkable prints and paintings of the artist Ashevak. Her work, which often draws inspiration from the animals that inhabit her surroundings, sparked our creativity. We examined various pieces of her artwork, discussing the techniques she used and the emotions her pieces convey. Encouraged by Ashevak's stunning representations, we were inspired to create our own Inuit-style paintings, capturing the essence of birds and fish in our artwork. The results were both imaginative and beautifully executed.












In our Maths lessons, the focus shifted to statistics, where we were introduced to different methods of presenting data. We explored line graphs, dual bar charts, and pie charts, and answered questions about the data shown. We also wrote our own questions about the data for our learning partners to answers.





In RE, we engaged in a thought-provoking debate surrounding the question, "Is Christianity still a strong religion 2000 years after Jesus?" Through researching various Christian charities such as Christian Aid and The Samaritans, we were able to present compelling arguments both for and against the issue. We expressed our viewpoints clearly and showed our critical thinking skills.






