Beech class we have been listening to The Carnival of Animals- Aquarium by Saints Saëns. We composed our own piece of music; representing the coral and fish using a range of tuned and untuned percussion. We used symbols to record our music and enjoyed performing it to the rest of the class.



We have also been discussing different emotions as part of PSHE and enjoyed role-playing various feelings through the medium of charades! The children found this to be great fun



Meet the next generation of Codebreakers! This week, Willow class, had a fantastic trip to Bletchley Park to learn about how the codebreakers contributed to the shortening of the Second World War by two to four years.

We saw where the codebreakers worked and tried our hand at codebreaking in our workshop. In our History lessons, we have been learning about the life and work of Alan Turing. We delved into various sources to find out how why, despite



his extraordinary accomplishments in the world of codebreaking, he was so badly treated. We saw a replica of Turing's Bombe machine, which looked incredibly complicated.

One visitor stopped to talk to us about their own experience as a child during the Blitz and their evacuation from London. There is nothing quite like hearing first hand experiences! Bletchley Park offered many hands on activities, which we thoroughly enjoyed.

At school we took our codebreaking skills into the forest. We encrypted messages related to the Second World War and had fun decoding each other's messages. Can you decipher this one?

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Online Safety

The internet is essential in 21st century life for education, business and social interaction. As children move up through the school their access to various types of technology increases and it stands to reason that their exploration and curiosity increases too. The positives of the digital world overwhelmingly outweigh the negatives but children, schools and parents all need to be aware of the everincreasing online risks.

Work with us to take an active role in teaching children about online dangers. Learning how to act safely when using the internet is an incredibly important part of safeguarding our children.

According to the latest research from Ofcom, nearly half of all 3-4 year olds have their own tablet. So it is never too early to start chatting to our children

about how to stay safe online. But how can we do this?

Here are some of our suggestions:

• Put Boundaries in place – This could be limiting screen time to 30 mins a day, or limiting the apps children have access to.

• Activate parental controls on your children's devices.

• Passwords - Keep your devices out of reach and set passwords on all your internet-enabled devices and don't share them. Then you'll know when and where your child is accessing the internet. Also, use passwords to make sure they're not making additional purchases when they're playing games or using apps.

• Make sure what children are watching is appropriate -Roblox and YouTube have games that may appear to be appropriate but are actually horror/ survival games and characters can turn more sinister as the game progresses. It is important to remember that children may be playing the game, watching videos of it on sites such as YouTube or playing replicated versions on Roblox for example.

• If your children are 8-10 years old, download InternetMatters app (android / App store), a new parent/child app to help you talk about e-safety issues in an interactive way.



- Ask them for their e-mail address so that you can message them directly
- Block them
- Talk to a trusted adult
- Meet up with them in real life to make sure it is safe
